Volunteers sought

UCI MIND, Orange County's only state and federally funded Alzheimer's Disease Research Center, is calling on Orange County residents age 65 to 85 who have normal memory function to help in meeting its urgent need for study participants in a clinical study underway.

The current clinical trial for which UCI MIND needs participants is called the "A4 Study." This study will evaluate whether giving an investigational drug can delay or prevent the onset of cognitive decline from Alzheimer's disease.

Participants will receive compensation for their time in participating, as well as access to medication that is believed to hold promise as a potential prevention.

Money talk

Applied Financial Planning, a group of financial advisers, will launch a radio show, "Money Wise with the Money Guys," on KOCI Radio.

Financial specialist Robert Micone will be the lead host of the program 9-9:30 a.m. Saturdays on 101.5 FM. The show begins May 6 and will broadcast to listeners in coastal Orange County, including Newport Beach, Costa Mesa, Huntington Beach, Irvine and surrounding areas.

Experts will discuss a wide range of current topics and events and how they impact the financial health of Orange County residents and businesses. Topics will include impending tax changes on the market and the effect on your portfolio, saving for college, the pinch on local government pensions and more.

Shooting for the moon

UC Irvine students will "shoot for the moon" thanks to a \$1 million gift from Base 11, a nonprofit STEM workforce development and entrepreneur accelerator.

The "Moonshot Initiative" will establish a rocketry program at The Henry Samueli School of Engineering, with the intent of making UCI the first academic institution to launch a liquid-fuel rocket into space.

The Base 11 donation will turn an existing area on the Engineering Tower's ground floor into a rocketry lab that enables students to design, build and test rocket prototypes between 15 and 50 feet long. It will also fund a mobile operations center and assembly trailer that can transport rockets to test sites and will allow students to make repairs off-site as needed.

Stopping tobacco abuse

UC Irvine student Bhavesh Patel has received \$10,000 from the Donald A. Strauss Public Service Scholarship Foundation to travel to rural India to design and implement a tobacco abuse prevention project in his senior year.

The goal is to create a model intervention program for youth at one public health center that can be spread to other centers.

Patel is a third-year biological sciences major with a minor in medical anthropology.

\$10 million grant

A UC Irvine study on the impact of environmental changes on malaria in sub-Saharan Africa has been awarded up to \$9.6 million over seven years from the National Institute of Allergy & Infectious Diseases, a part of the National Institutes of Health.

The funding establishes UCI as one of the International Centers of Excellence for Malaria Research, which will engage in projects in Africa, Asia and Latin America. Guiyun Yan, professor of public health, leads the UCI project.

Helping low-income students

UC Irvine is aligning with 67 of the nation's top colleges and universities to increase the number of talented low- and moderate-income students at undergraduate institutions.

American Talent Initiative members will improve their own efforts to recruit, enroll and support lower-income students; learn from each other; and contribute to research that will help other colleges and universities expand opportunity.

Pitch competition

Synova Life Sciences, a regenerative medicine company, won the fourth Get Started Orange County pitch competition hosted by Cox Business.

Held at Irvine in front of more than 400 entrepreneurs and businesses, John Chi, CEO of the Irvine-based company, delivered a 2 ¹/₂-minute pitch and answered questions from a panel of expert judges, ultimately taking first place: \$10,000 in cash and services from Cox Business.

The Fullerton-based nonprofit <u>Hart Community Homes</u> has opened its second Monkey Business Cafe.

The cafe, which creates jobs and offers work experience for emancipating foster youth, is on the second floor of OC Music and Dance, 17620 Fitch Ave., Irvine. Participants are employed as servers, cashiers, baristas, cooks, food prep workers and dishwashers.

Fund raised

UC Irvine's first-ever Giving Day raised \$1.4 million within 24 hours – exceeding its goal of \$1 million – to support students, research and innovative programs across campus.

Giving Day donations poured in from more than 1,800 benefactors in over 30 states and nine countries. A large portion of the gifts came from UCI alumni.

Library grant

The UC Irvine libraries have been awarded an Institute of Museum and Library Services grant in the community anchors category for "Transforming Knowledge/Transforming Libraries."

This three-year research project will explore the outcomes of undergraduate students applying what they learn in ethnic studies combined with lived experience in contributing to community archives.

Volunteerism award

Irvine resident Stephanie Cannaday, an associate general counsel for Optum Services in Orange County, was named a OneOC Spirit of Volunteerism Award winner.

Stephanie was recognized for the hands-on volunteer work she has provided over the past several years — both on her own and on behalf of Optum's charity committees — for a diversity of local nonprofit programs and projects.
